Study Abroad Transferrable skills

Transferrable skills are the skills you have acquired during any activity in your life that are *transferrable and applicable* to what you want to do in a particular position. As a study abroad returnee, you have developed a wide range of skills that have prepared you for multiple career options after graduation. In the table below you will find a list of skills commonly developed through study abroad and suggestions for you to "think about" how you may have developed these skills through your experience.
