A Site of Struggle: American Art Against Anti-Black Violence

A Site of Struggle takes a new approach to looking at the intersection of race, violence, and art by investigating the varied strategies American artists have used to grapple with anti-Black violence, ranging from representation to abstraction and from literal to metaphorical. The exhibition focuses on works created between the 1890s and 2013—situating contemporary artistic practice within a longer history of American art and visual culture. It foregrounds African Americans as active shapers of visual

culture and highlights how art has been used to protest, process, and mourn.







In this talk, Professor Ruth HaCohen discusses the soundtracks of two "Joban" movies whose plots take place in the 1950s and '60s in the American Midwest. The first film, the Coen brothers' *A Serious Man* (2009), is "Jewish" in the sense that its protagonists are active members of a practicing Jewish community in a Minnesota suburb. The second, Terrence Malick's *Tree of Life* (2011), is "Christian," as it centers on a family who are members of a Catholic community in Texas. Both movies are autobiographical, as their authors attest. The talk takes as its point of departure the long legacy of the Book of Job's reception in each of the respective

religious communities as well as their traditional contrasting approaches to questions of noise and harmony. It seeks to show the critical role played by the sonic dimension of the movies for fathoming their deeper meaning vis à-vis their Joban orientation.



For more than 70 years, Northwestern University's Music Academy in Evanston has provided music instruction to children and adult students from surrounding communities and the greater Chicago and Northwest Indiana area.

Most Academy instructors also teach in the Henry and Leigh Bienen School of Music and hold masters and doctoral degrees in music teaching and performance. The Academy often serves as a teaching laboratory for college students enrolled in pedagogy courses and is a member of the National Guild of Community Schools of the Arts.

Kindermusik (newborn to age 6)

This 45-minute class is a lovely way for young children and parents to interact. Multi-level activities that are appropriate for each stage of a child's development give lap babies, crawlers, and walkers a chance to explore music, touch, sound, and movement. Home materials including a CD, a book related to the theme of the unit, and an instrument provide additional ideas for sharing the class experience at home.

Other Courses (offered virtually and in-person Spring Quarter)

Piano and Organ

The Music Academy Piano Division offers pre-piano class, which serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction: keyboard instruction in two tracks for students ages 6 to 18, and instruction for adults. Pre-piano serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction. Keyboard instruction for children begins with pre-staff music and expands to landmark-based intervallic reading. After the first year of study, most children participate in the Illinois State Music Teacher's Association curriculum assessment, where they demonstrate skills and receive certificates and pins for participation.

Strings

The String Division offers private lessons in violin, viola, and cello, with goals of both providing musical instruction and instilling a love of music and of learning music. The division believes that all children can learn to their potential when placed in an environment that includes clear instruction, an involved parent, and regular opportunities to listen to and perform.

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

When British Petroleum was looking to have their film *The Third River* translated into Arabic, they turned to Palestinian writer and painter Jabra Ibrahim Jabra, who worked as an editor for the Iraq Petroleum Company's influential in-house industry and culture publications. Better known for translating T.S. Eilot's *The Wasteland* and William Faulkner's *The Sound and the Fury* into Arabic, Jabra's correspondence also frequently appears in the archives of United States Cold War projects, such as Franklin Books and the CIA's Congress for Cultural Freedom. This talk will explore the intersection of oil, modernism, and empire, to consider how pipelines and energy infrastructure curate Arabic literature.

Da'wa as Development: Kuwaiti Islamic Charity in Africa

Since the 1980s, Direct Aid has been centralizing religious and development work in complexes that comprise orphanages, schools, clinics, and mosques. The Islamic NGO therefore cannot be confined to narrow Western categorizations of Gulf Salafi da'wa (proselytizing) institutions. Direct Aid's approach is strategically grounded in comprehensiveness/"holism," which serves to blur established categories of "charity," "relief," and "development" to become da'wa-as-development. What is the cultural and religious impact of Gulf funding in Africa? How do Kuwait headquarters interact with African beneficiaries?

Defiant Geographies: Race & Urban Space in 1920s Rio de Janeiro

As the country celebrated the centenary of its independence, its postabolition whitening ideology took on material form in the urban development project that staged Latin America's first World's Fair. The book explores official efforts to reorganize space that equated modernization with racial



progress. It also considers the ways in which black and blackened subjects mobilized their own spatial logics to introduce alternative ways of occupying the city. Leu unpacks how the spaces of the urban poor are racialized, and the impact of this process for those who do not fit the ideal models of urbanity that come to define the national project. *Defiant Geographies* puts the mutual production of race and space at the heart of scholarship on Brazil's urban development and understands urban reform as a monumental act of forgetting the country's racial past.

While empires collapsed and fledgling democracies faltered, they chased deposed empresses, international financiers, and Balkan gun-runners, and then knocked back doubles late into the night. *Last Call*



at the Hotel Imperial is the extraordinary story of John Gunther, H. R. Knickerbocker, Vincent Sheean, and Dorothy Thompson. In those tumultuous years, they landed exclusive interviews with Hitler and Mussolini, Nehru and Gandhi, and helped shape what Americans knew about the world. Alongside these backstage glimpses into the halls of power, they left another equally incredible set of records. Living in the heady afterglow of Freud, they subjected themselves to frank, critical scrutiny and argued about love, war, sex, death, and everything in between.

Specifically, this event is designed to help us think critically about archival absences, losses, or restrictions, especially in cases of cataclysmic violence such as genocide and partition or in the context of authoritarian regimes. In contexts in which archives and documents have been destroyed, or perhaps fabricated, or in which access is restricted, what alternative methods might shed light on those lives, experiences, and voices that have been silenced or effaced? How might scholars and artists approach the material world, such as ruined buildings, or alternative documents, such as hand drawn maps or carpets, when official documents do not exist, are themselves falsified, or are beyond reach? How might we think beyond the limits of documents altogether in conceiving of sources, spaces, tools, and perspectives with which to untangle the legacies of the past in the present? In this roundtable, we bring together scholars and practitioners from several different disciplines to reflect on how to negotiate the limits of the archive and decipher the traces of the past beyond the archive.

<u>Common Understandings, Poetic Confusion: Playhouses and Playgoers</u> <u>in Elizabethan England</u>

What if going to a play in Elizabethan England was more like attending a football match than a Broadway show—or playing in one? In *Common Understandings, Poetic Confusion,* Will West proposes a new account of the kind of participatory entertainment expected by the actors and the audience during the careers of Shakespeare and his contemporaries. West finds surprising descriptions of these theatrical experiences in the figurative language of early modern players and playgoers—including understanding, confusion, occupation, eating, and fighting. Such words and ways of speaking are still in use today, but their earlier meanings,

like that of theater itself, are subtly, importantly different from our own. Playing was not confined to the actors on the stage but filled the playhouse, embracing audiences and performers in collaborative experiences that did not belong to any one alone but to the assembled, various crowd. What emerged in playing was a kind of thinking and feeling distributed across persons and times that were otherwise distinct. Thrown apples, smashed bottles of beer, and lumbering bears—these and more gave verbal shape to the physical interactions between players and playgoers, creating circuits of exchange, production, and consumption.



<u>Decolonizing Research Paradigms of Archaeological Collections in</u> <u>Foreign Museums: Learned Experiences from Puerto Rico</u>

In this presentation, Paola Schiappacasse will reflect on the difficulties experienced by local Caribbeanists to study heritage currently located in museums, foundations, and universities outside the region. Then, she will demonstrate that studying collections from the 19th and early 20th century sheds light on contributions made by local people who were involved in finding, acquiring, and exchanging artifacts, and helps reshape the narrative that only ´foreigners´ were responsible for the growth of the discipline. Various case studies from Puerto Rican collections will highlight the type of documentation that can be consulted and ways to unveil new understandings of the dynamics that took place. Finally, recent, and future lines of research will be presented to encourage archaeological collections-based research.

Audiocassette technology gave an opening to ordinary individuals, from singers to smugglers, to challenge state-controlled Egyptian media. Enabling an unprecedented number of people to participate in the creation of culture and circulation of content, cassette players and tapes soon informed broader cultural, political, and economic developments and defined "modern" Egyptian households

Cantera literally means "quarry," but the Spanish word is used in Mexico to describe a specific brittle rock used to build colonial churches and civic infrastructure. More recently, a network of Mexican guarrymen, stonemasons,

homebuilders, architects, and businessmen have refined a cantera market that caters to a Mexican and Mexican American clientele in the American Southwest. Architectural History Is Migrant History recasts Mexican construction-related labor by tracking the development of a meaningful and sophisticated industry that has reshaped design norms and building trades in two countries from the shadows of a formal American economy.



The Perfect Fit: Creative Work in the Global Shoe Industry

We know a lot about how clothing and shoes are made cheaply, but very little about the process when they are made beautifully. In *The Perfect Fit*, Claudio E. Benzecry looks at the craft that goes into designing shoes for women in the US market, revealing that this creative process takes place on a global scale. Based on unprecedented behind-the-scenes access, *The Perfect Fit* offers an ethnographic window into the day-to-day life of designers, fit models, and technicians as they put together samples and prototypes, showing how expert work is a complement to and a necessary condition for factory exploitation.

Literary Authority in West African Islam

Contact: Rebecca Shereikis, 847-491-2598, r-shereikis@northwestern.edu Ten years ago, Charles Stewart and Bruce Hall published a paper* outlining a "Core Curriculum" they argued was common to teaching and learning across Muslim communities in West Africa. This talks revisits that article using a sample of manuscripts from West African manuscript libraries that is nearly three times larger (43,000 manuscripts) than the original one. Its findings: (1) nearly all the works and authors originally cited as the core of teaching in West Africa are confirmed, and (2) the larger sample expands that core of most-commonly found texts to 204 authors and 323 works. These texts make up about thirty percent of all authored manuscripts accessible through the West African Arabic Manuscript Database, and, arguably, across West Africa's Arabic manuscript culture. Twenty percent of those works were written by West African scholars. In addition to providing a template for writing an intellectual history, this compilation of literary authority documents the emergence of an autonomous Arabic culture in nineteenth century in West Africa.

Returning to Luqmãn: Wisdom, Subjectivity, and Islamic Tradition

Luqmān." A similar line of inquiry pervades modern Arabic writing and discussions. Rather than a 'search for origins' or authenticity, the speaker Dahlia E.M. Gubara is concerned with the multiplicity of the Luqmānic iterations, the discursive postulates they animate, and how they might intersect with modes of inhabiting the world today. Her hypothesis is that the many lives of Luqmān are united by an understanding of knowledge-as-being encapsulated in the plurivalent meanings of hikma, rendering him as a narratological and epistemological device that performs the work of tradition.


