

Taking Shape: Abstraction from the Arab World, 1950s - 1980s

Taking Shape: Abstraction from the Arab World, 1950s–1980s explores mid-20th-century abstract art from North Africa, West Asia, and the Arab diaspora—a vast geographic expanse that encompasses diverse cultural, ethnic, linguistic, and religious backgrounds. Comprising nearly 90 works by artists from countries including Algeria, Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Morocco, Palestine, Qatar, Sudan, Syria, Tunisia, and the United Arab Emirates (UAE), the exhibition is drawn from the collection of the <u>Barjeel Art Foundation</u> based in Sharjah, UAE. The paintings, sculpture, drawings, and prints on view here reflect the wide range of nonfigurative art practices that flourishes in the Arab world over the course of four decades.



Small town local Mona was cast as an extra in the movie, but shortly after his death, Mona has a child who she claims was conceived with Dean during the shoot. Art Blakey and his Jazz Messengers were considered the quintessential

"hard bop" group, ushering in a new subgenre of jazz incorporating rhythm and blues, gospel, soul, and blues concepts as a counterpoint to the more frenetic bebop genre. The Jazz Messengers evolved into a proving ground for young talent, and having the group on one's resume conveyed immediate bona fides. Composer, arranger, and pianist Tadd Dameron is known for such compositions as *Our Delight, Good Bait,* and *Hot House.* He arranged for such giants of the jazz world as Count Basie, Artie Shaw, Dizzy Gillespie, and Sarah Vaughan. In this performance, the Jazz Small Ensembles focus on hard bop classics made famous by Art Blakey and the Jazz Messengers, as well as Tadd Dameron favorites.

To tell this story, Thompson analyzes how Black American and African photographers, including Lorna Simpson, Lyle Ashton Harris, Dawoud Bey, Kay Hassan, Zarina Bhimji, and Mohamed Bourouissa, incorporate Polaroids into their contemporary art practices. The artists presented have varying ideas about the role of color in photographic representation. Also, their respective artistic practices reveal understudied elements to the history of Polaroids in Africa and the Black Diaspora, including the ways Polaroids have revolutionized how Black people in the United States and Africa viewed themselves and how instant color photography profited literally from state surveillance. This idea of "Coloring Black Surveillance" seeks to introduce a framework that places the arts of Africa and the Black Diaspora into greater conversation with Black American art.



Andrew Solomon is a writer of remarkable talent and intellect. His books and essays explore the subjects of politics, culture and psychology with extraordinary humanity.

His memoir, *The Noonday Demon: An Atlas of Depression,* won the National Book Award, was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize, and was a worldwide bestseller – published in more than twenty languages. It is included in the London *Times* One Hundred Best Books of the Decade, and it is widely considered the definitive text on depression. It is not until Buffon that we find a direct opposition between the power of Man and the power of Nature, both endowed with a capital letter. Faced with such an ideological opposition and its practical consequences, it may be useful to adopt an anthropological approach, an approach to the representations and practices found in another culture, removed from our own in space and/or time, in a process of differential and critical comparison with our own paradigm. Here the various ancient Greek conceptions of phusis as the Promethean conception of the technai can help us to open up new critical perspectives, in an anthropopoietic and ecopoietic way, about the reciprocal relationships of human beings with their environment.



In this talk, which is based on his new book In the Shade of the Sunna: Salafi Piety in the 20th Century Middle East, Aaron Rock-Singer argues that Salafism is a creation of the twentieth century and that its signature practices emerged primarily out of Salafis' competition with other social movements amid the intellectual and social upheavals of modernity. In doing so, he moves beyond the surface claims of Salafism's own proponents—and the academics who often reproduce them—into the larger sociocultural and intellectual forces that have shaped Islam's fastest growing revivalist movement.

Functional Neurological Disorder (FND), otherwise known as Conversion Disorder and once known as hysteria, is characterized by abnormal sensory or motor symptoms that are determined to be "incompatible" with neurological disease. FND patients are a challenge for contemporary medicine. They experience high levels of distress, disability, and social isolation, yet a large proportion of those treated do not get better. Patients with FNDs are often misdiagnosed and suffer from stigma, dysfunctional medical encounters and scarcity of adequate treatments.

Lecturer Rebecca Seligman, PhD will argue that medicine's struggle with FNDs is itself a symptom of a biomedical ontology that constrains the medical imagination, impedes understanding of mind-body processes and constrains what is understood to be possible, real, and treatable.



Bridges and Barriers to Movement Function in People with Parkinson's Disease

Yet, there is considerable heterogeneity in the expression of motor deficits and the rate of progression of disease across individuals. The first part of this presentation will review evidence that the presence of a rare sleep disorder, termed REM sleep behavior disorder, is a harbinger of phenoconversion to a phenotype of Parkinson's disease or related disorder that is dominated by postural instability, gait disturbances and cognitive impairment. The second part of the presentation will describe evidence that, even in individuals with profound akinesia, the capacity to initiate and execute good quality movements can be intact, but is highly dependent upon the mode of movement initiation. Practical examples of interventions that can be used by physical therapists and caregivers to facilitate movement initiation and execution will be described.

losses in CVH begin the accumulation of cardiovascular risk early in life and translate to a greater burden of disease later in life. This talk will focus on our current understanding trajectories of cardiovascular health starting at birth and will highlight innovative new projects addressing these issues.

Gene expression programs change over time, development and maturation, and in response to stimuli. While gene regulation can be studied indirectly by quantifying total RNAs, directly measuring nascent or newly transcribed RNAs is required to reveal the immediate regulatory changes in response to developmental, environmental, and pathological signals. To gain a more complete mechanistic understanding of cell-type specific regulation of RNA dynamics in diverse biological processes, we have recently developed new technologies that can quantitatively distinguish newly synthesized ("new") from pre-existing ("old") RNAs in the same single cell at scale. We demonstrate that time-resolved single cell transcriptomics method can generate high temporal resolution RNA expression data (at the time scale of minutes to hours), which bring deeper insights into the molecular and cellular mechanisms in dynamic systems. Finally, by enabling quantitative analysis of mRNA kinetic parameters (synthesis, splicing & degradation), our approach can better define mechanistic link between RNA dynamics and cell state transition or any perturbation, thereby exploring the regulatory wiring of a cell beyond transcriptional control alone.

The unusual gating kinetics of HERG channels, most notably rapid and voltage-dependent inactivation coupled to slow deactivation, are particularly well suited for regulating cardiac repolarization and suppression of cardiac arrhythmias. 

For more than 70 years, Northwestern University's Music Academy in Evanston has provided music instruction to children and adult students from surrounding communities and the greater Chicago and Northwest Indiana area.

Most Academy instructors also teach in the Henry and Leigh Bienen School of Music and hold masters and doctoral degrees in music teaching and performance. The Academy often serves as a teaching laboratory for college students enrolled in pedagogy courses and is a member of the National Guild of Community Schools of the Arts.

Piano and Organ

The Music Academy Piano Division offers pre-piano class, which serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction: keyboard instruction in two tracks for students ages 6 to 18, and instruction for adults. Pre-piano serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction. Keyboard instruction for children begins with pre-staff music and expands to landmark-based intervallic reading. After the first year of study, most children participate in the Illinois State Music Teacher's Association curriculum assessment, where they demonstrate skills and receive certificates and pins for participation.

The String Division offers private lessons in violin, viola, and cello, with goals of both providing musical instruction and instilling a love of music and of learning music. The division believes that all children can learn to their potential when placed in an environment that includes clear instruction, an involved parent, and regular opportunities to listen to and perform.


