Years after the emergence of Ni Una Menos in Argentina and #MeToo in the United States, how do feminist activists and general audiences in both countries evaluate and transform communication of sexual and gender-based violence? Drawing from cross-country survey experiments and interviews with feminist actors and general publics, I analyze how two countries in the Americas-loci of some of the largest anti-violence movements in recent times-are constructing, challenging, and resisting communication for gender equality.

Celeste Wagner (Ph.D., University of Pennsylvania) is an Assistant Professor at the College of Journalism and Communications at the University of Florida. Through mixed and comparative methods, her research studies media reception and impact around social and political issues, with a particular focus on intersecting gender inequalities.

This lecture will examine how medieval people with leprosy imagined the processes by which their bodies and identities transformed. Leprosy was a degenerative condition that often carried a long prognosis and significant changes in mobility, appearance, and social positioning. We will explore how people

with the disease were often caught between the memories of their former, healthy identities, and the realities of their ailing presents. At the same time, we will consider how memory was used to craft communities of care around and among leprous people that centered on the inherent mutability of human flesh, and the potential of all bodies to become leprous.

The concept of patriarchy is attached to a big promise: the promise of a unified explanation for gender injustice across many places and times. 'Patriarchy' is our name for the system that reproduces systemic gender injustice. But the standard view of patriarchy as a system of men's dominance over women fails us. It distorts or erases the complex, relational field of gendered power wherein we find hierarchies among women, the regular mistreatment of marginalized men (such as gay or Black men), and harms targeting those who are androgynous or intersex. Many feminist scholars, including Judith Butler and Sally Haslanger, conclude from this that we must do away with the concept of patriarchy. Patriarchy, they say, does not exist. In this talk, I'll offer an alternative path--a new paradigm for patriarchy. Through this paradigm, we see patriarchy as the institutionalized system of regulating people in accordance with cultural ideals of what men and women are and ought to be. While this system devalues women as women, it does not do so equally, nor does it thereby benefit men as men. Patriarchy works to the primary benefit of those who most closely approximate institutionalized ideals of manhood--ideals that, in our own context, are configured to align with capitalism. white supremacy, heteronormativity, and ableism. Put simply, patriarchy puts "Real Men" on top.

The Ji laboratory studies normal hematopoiesis and myeloid malignancies. Erythropoiesis, the process by which red blood cells mature, must be carefully regulated under steady state conditions and goes awry under stress/disease conditions. The Ji lab and colleagues recently showed important pathways that regulate normal erythropoiesis and how defects in these pathways induce anemia and ineffective erythropoiesis. This talk will highlight implications of this and further research and how dysregulation of erythropoiesis contributes to disease pathogenesis in myeloid neoplasms.



Northwestern's Institute for Sexual and Gender Minority Health and Wellbeing is thrilled to invite you to the December installment of our "Current Issues in LGBTQ Health" series featuring Morgan Purrier, Ph.D.

Urban environments have long been argued to benefit LGBTQ people, especially queer men, through agglomerating queer spaces, resources, and partners. Large cities, such as New York, Chicago, and Los Angeles, frequently garner attention for their gayborhoods, queer leisure, sexual health programs, and dense queer populations. Despite these seemingly queer rich environments, many individuals remain separated, excluded, or dismissed from accessing such dense resources. Dr. Purrier uses the concept of sexual deserts—similar to the term food deserts—to refer to the systematic and structured inequalities in access to quality leisure and space. Focusing on queer men living in sexual deserts, he highlights both the overall difficulty in accessing quality sexual resources and the strategies utilized to build sociogeographic networks of partners and places.

The Center for Behavioral Intervention Technologies (CBITs)

Northwestern University, in collaboration with the <u>Society for Digital Mental Health</u> Dr. Nick Jacobson is a tenure-track assistant professor in the departments of Biomedical Data Science and Psychiatry within the Center for Technology and Behavioral Health in the Geisel School of Medicine at Dartmouth College. He directs the AI and Mental Health: Innovation in Technology Guided Healthcare (AIM HIGH) Laboratory. Dr. Jacobson researches the use of technology to enhance both the assessment and treatment of anxiety and depression. He has a strong interest in creating personalized just-in-time adaptive interventions and the quantitative tools that make this work possible. To date, Dr. Jacobson's smartphone applications which assess and treat anxiety and depression have been downloaded and installed by more than 50,000 people in over 100 countries. Dr. Jacobson is the principal investigator of an R01 Awarded from the National Institute of Mental Health studying the use of personalized deep learning models to predict rapid changes in major depressive disorder symptoms using passive sensor data from smartphones and wearable devices.

"Exhibiting Blackness: Anthropology, Museums, and the Persistent Western Imagination": a talk by Monique R. Scott

Monique R. Scott is an anthropologist with a career as both a scholar of museums and as a museum professional working within museums.

Scott specializes in how diverse museum visitors make meaning of race and culture in museums, particularly representations of Africa and people of African descent, the basis for her 2007 book Rethinking Evolution in the Museum: Envisioning African Origins. Her recent research focuses on the representation of Africa in Philadelphia museums, exploring the dense tension between African objects collected as art or artifact in some of the country's oldest museums.

In this talk, a Martinican political philosopher and historical sociologist challenges the dominant narratives of French republicanism and of women's history in France. This lecture aims to show the heuristic force of a "black feminist epistemology" in praxis, bringing together the Caribbean, Africa, France, and the United States.

Silyane Larcher is a tenured research scholar in political sciences at the CNRS (French National Center for Scientific Research). With Felix Germain, she coedited Black French Women and the Struggle for Equality (1848-2016), published at the University Press of Nebraska in 2018. Her main field of research focuses on the tensions between race and citizenship and universalism in France. She is particularly interested in political conflictuality inherited from the colonial past and the democratic present. Her next book (to be published by Le Seuil in 2023), based on a long-term qualitative survey, deals with the social and historical conditions of afrofeminism in France.

For more than 70 years, Northwestern University's Music Academy in Evanston has provided music instruction to children and adult students from surrounding communities and the greater Chicago and Northwest Indiana area.

Most Academy instructors also teach in the Henry and Leigh Bienen School of Music and hold masters and doctoral degrees in music teaching and performance. The Academy often serves as a teaching laboratory for college students enrolled in pedagogy courses and is a member of the National Guild of Community Schools of the Arts.

Piano and Organ

The Music Academy Piano Division offers pre-piano class, which serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction: keyboard instruction in two tracks for students ages 6 to 18, and instruction for adults. Pre-piano serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction. Keyboard instruction for children begins with pre-staff music and expands to landmark-based intervallic reading. After the first year of study, most children participate in the Illinois State Music Teacher's Association curriculum assessment, where they demonstrate skills and receive certificates and pins for participation.


