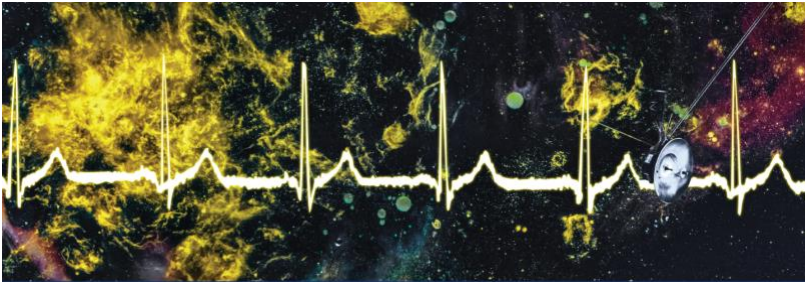

What do we owe to the memories of one another's hearts?

For American artist Dario Robleto (b. 1972), artists and scientists share a common aspiration: to increase the sensitivity of their observations.

Throughout the history of scientific invention, instruments like the cardiograph and the telescope have extended the reach of perception from the tiniest stirrings of the human body to the farthest reaches of space. In his prints, sculptures, and video and sound installations, Robleto contemplates the emotional significance of these technologies, bringing us closer to the latent traces of life buried in the scientific record.

The Heart's Knowledge concentrates on the most recent decade of Robleto's creative practice, a period of deepening engagement with histories of medicine, biomedical engineering, sound recording, and space exploration. The exhibition organizes the artist's conceptually ambitious, elegantly wrought artworks as a series of multisensory encounters between art and science. Each work seeks to attune viewers to the material traces of life at scales ranging from the intimate to the universal, returning always to the question: Does empathy extend beyond the boundaries of time and space?

Adapted from anarchist writer B. Traven's namesake novel and shot by renowned cinematographer Gabriel Figueroa, ROSA BLANCA (1961) is a Mexican Golden era film directed by Roberto Gavaldón, critically depicting the neo-colonial land acquisition efforts of foreign oil companies in post-Revolutionary Mexico. Taking place in 1937, a year before the national expropriation of oil in the country, the film tells the story of Jacinto Yañez (Ignacio López Tarso), a warm and welcoming family man who maintains the Rosa Blanca, a third-generation hacienda and employer to residents of rural Veracruz. Yañez's plot of land becomes the plot of a larger tale of greed and deceit when Los Angeles-based Condor Oil Company and its cunning president, Robert G. Kollenz (Reinhold Olszewski), set sights on acquiring it in a bid to control the area's oil-rich supply chain and further cement the presence of foreign multi-national interests in the region. Futile attempts to convince a proud Yañez of selling his land range from overt bribes to veiled threats, finally bringing Yañez to Los Angeles to meet face-to-face with Kollenz himself. La Rosa Blanca concludes in a powerful montage blending documentary footage and audio of President Lázaro Cardenas and his decree

to nationalize the oil industry. The film's uncompromising vision of capital's ruthless political intervention and resource extraction and led to its being banned until 1972—but its themes continue to resonate in the country today.

A landmark of Latin American cinema, ARAYA (1959) is Margot Benacerraf's brilliant nonfiction tone-poem of the life and work of the traditional salineros (salt workers) of the Araya peninsula, a region off the northeast coast of Venezuela known for its natural salt marshes. ARAYA lyricizes the daily toil and timeless gestures of a community whose workers follow traditional methods deeply interconnected with an environment of endless sea and blazing sun. The two-person crew of Benacerraf and cameraman Giuseppe Nisoli captured this visually enthralling portrait of the rhythms of daily life just before introduction of industrial machinery transformed a practice of land subsistence that had stayed the same for nearly 500 years. Credited as a predecessor to feminist cinema in South America and the launch of New Latin Cinema, ARAYA is a hybrid nonfiction classic of lasting importance and spectacular beauty. In spring 2020, a global pandemic sent the city of Chelsea, Massachusetts, spiraling into chaos. Chelsea's frontline workers risked their lives to help others, while its essential workers' incomes dropped to zero overnight.

Hundreds of citizens waited in blocks-long lines to pick up food at a makeshift distribution center. Chelsea quickly became a COVID hot spot, and the governor was forced to call in the National Guard to distribute food boxes throughout the city.

City leaders, overwhelmed by the high costs of feeding a city and humbled by their own lack of expertise to do so efficiently, came together in a desperate

moment with a simple but inspired idea: give people money and let them spend it however they see fit. It was the beginning of CHELSEA EATS, the largest basic income pilot in American history: one that gave 2000 individuals and families direct payments of up to \$400 a month with no strings attached.

RAISING THE FLOOR is the moving narrative of a majority Latinx community coming together to feed neighbors and strangers during an unprecedented public health crisis. It is the inspiring story of a group of local leaders whose sense of helplessness and concern led to bold policy innovation. The research findings from the Chelsea pilot offer lessons that resonate beyond one Massachusetts city and make a compelling case for reconsidering public policies around poverty and inequality in post-pandemic America.

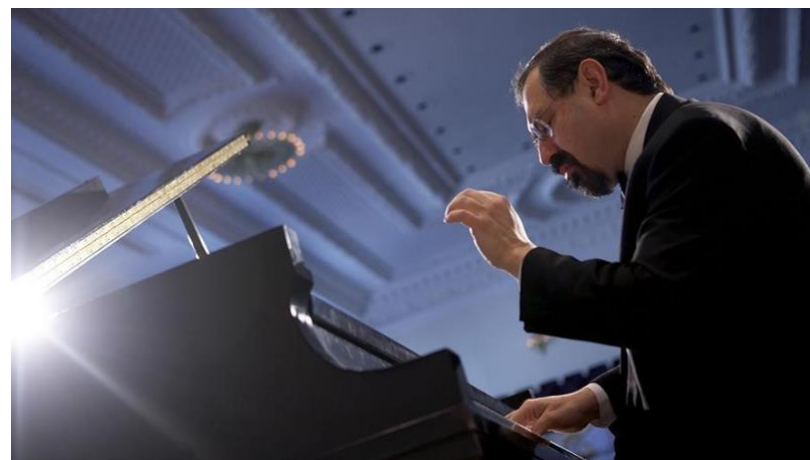

Hailed for his "unfailingly beautiful" tone and "enviable technique" (*Boston Globe*), Moscow-born pianist Boris Berman has given performances on six continents, including solo appearances with the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra, London's Philharmonia, the Toronto Symphony, the Israel Philharmonic, the St. Petersburg Philharmonic, and the Royal Scottish Orchestra. His chamber music collaborations have included such artists as Heinz Holliger, Ralph Kirshbaum, and the Tokyo and Vermeer Quartets. He has recorded all of the Scriabin piano sonatas, and his recital recording of Shostakovich works on the Ottavo label received the Edison Classic Award. A dedicated teacher, Berman currently heads the piano department at the Yale School of Music. His program showcases music of Brahms and Ukrainian composer Valentin Silvestrov.

Memorably monumental.” Taking its inspiration from pianist Mieczysław Horszowski, who instructed the trio’s pianist Rieko Aizawa at the Curtis Institute, the ensemble’s repertoire includes music of Fauré, Granados, Ravel, Saint-Saëns, Martinů, and Villa-Lobos—composers who collaborated with Horszowski during his lifetime. The group has performed the complete cycles of piano trios by Beethoven, Schumann, and Brahms, and actively cultivates lesser-known treasures from the trio repertoire by Arno Babajanian, Leonard Bernstein, Vincent d’Indy, and Morton Feldman, among others. One of the most sought-after countertenors of his generation, Bienen alumnus Kangmin Justin Kim has earned recognition for his roles in Baroque repertoire, contemporary music, and Mozart’s trouser roles. Jazz saxophonist Julian Edwin “Cannonball” Adderley is perhaps best remembered for the 1966 soul jazz single “Mercy, Mercy, Mercy,” written for him by his keyboardist Joe Zawinul. A member of the Miles Davis Sextet, Adderley appeared on the landmark records *Milestones* and *Kind of Blue*, eventually recording his own album in 1958, *Somethin’ Else*, featuring Davis on trumpet. Over the course of his career, Adderley collaborated with a host of other jazz luminaries including saxophonists Charles Lloyd and Yusef

Lateef; pianists Bobby Timmons and Victor Feldman; bassists Sam Jones and Walter Booker; and drummers Louis Hayes and Roy McCurdy. This concert features the music that defined Adderley’s various combos, as well as lesser-known repertoire.

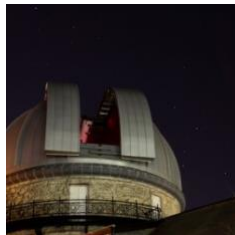

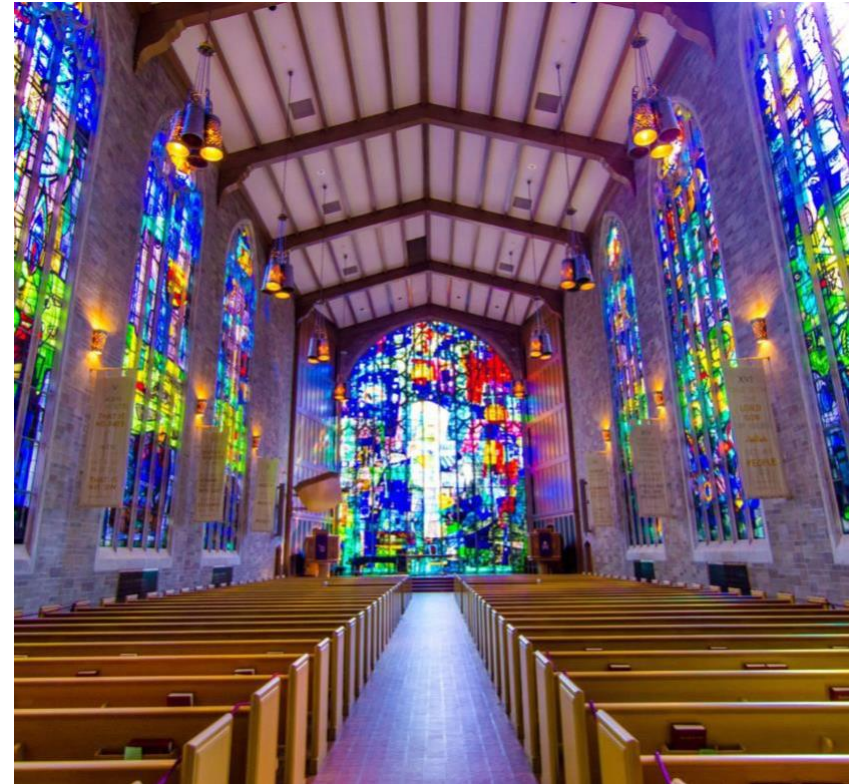

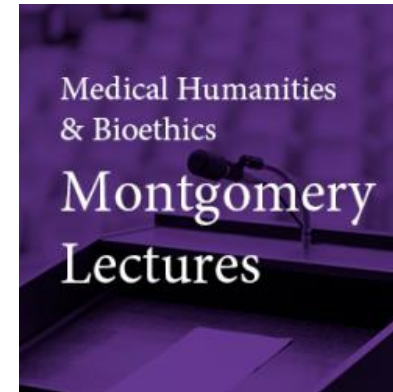

It is broadly believed that the Russian civilization is the inheritor of Byzantium. Those who detest both Byzantium and Russia explain the latter's defects as the former's birthmarks. Those who want to extol Russia often attribute its greatness to its Byzantine "genes." In recent decades, the discourse on Byzantium and the alleged role it has played in "Russian spirituality," or, to the contrary, "Russian doom," have frequently come up in Russian public debates. It is time to rethink the very foundations of Russian culture (Rus'), and to do it in a serious, scholarly manner, free of ideological bias and sensationalism.

As the field of Human-Robot Interaction (HRI) continues to grow, researchers are studying increasingly complex human-robot social interactions, including those that involve multiple people and/or multiple robots. This growing body of work has demonstrated that robots can do more than influence one person's behavior, robots can also shape the interactions between people. 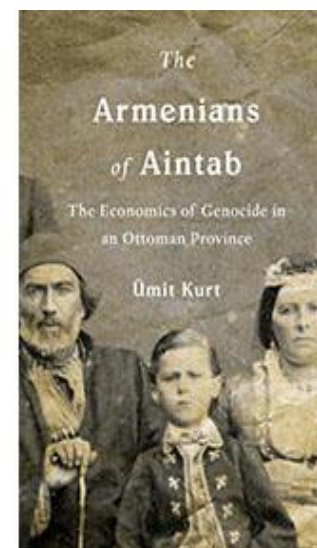

"Walking While Trans:" How Gendered Spatial Stigma and Biased Police

Deployment Drive Transgender Discrimination in Sex Work Arrests. Kris

Rosentel is a PhD Student in the Department of Sociology and a Mellon Cluster

Fellow in Gender & Sexuality Studies.

Existing research suggests that trans women of color experience discrimination

related to the policing of sex work, which can increase vulnerability to

victimization and negative mental health outcomes. The dominant narrative has

coalesced around a diagnosis of this issue: trans women are being arrested for

simply "walking while trans." This study assesses the mechanisms driving

transgender discrimination using a dataset of sex work-related arrests from the

Chicago Police Department (CPD). While findings confirm the use of gender-based profiling, they also suggest that the "walking while trans" explanation has overlooked another important discriminatory mechanism, which Rosenthal terms "concentrating while trans." This mechanism involves police administration disproportionately deploying aggressive tactics to spaces where trans feminine sex workers gather.

Dr. García is one of the foremost researchers worldwide in the study of neurocysticercosis, a preventable parasitic infection of the central nervous system caused by the pork tapeworm *Taenia solium*. He is the primary author of two trendsetting studies on cysticidal treatment for neurocysticercosis. Cysticidal drugs, namely albendazole and praziquantel, destroy brain cysts. Dr. García's studies examined the clinical benefits of these drugs and showed that combining them increases the destruction of brain cysts without increasing side effects, improving treatment and long-term prognosis for patients with neurocysticercosis.

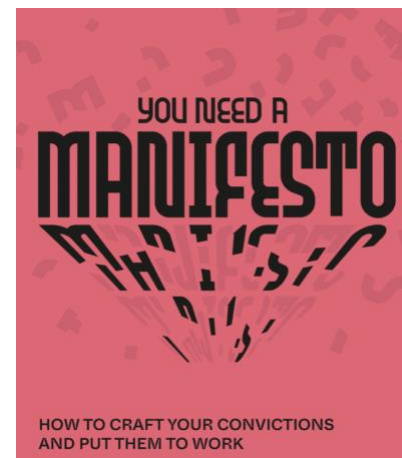

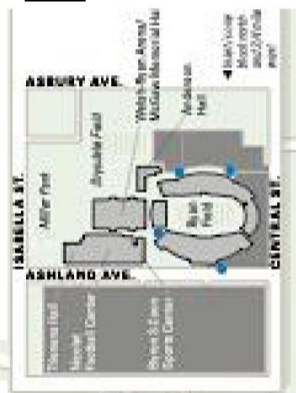
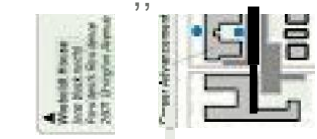
