In her contribution to *The Heart's Knowledge* catalogue, Jennifer Roberts (Professor of the Humanities, Harvard University) writes that "the act of measurement cannot be separated from the search for meaning." What are the tools that artists and scientists use to observe and measure the unknown? How might we use those tools collaboratively to construct new pathways of human understanding across time and distance? How might shared values of empathy, care, and curiosity guide such pursuits? In this opening conversation, Robleto and Roberts will be joined by Lucianne Walkowicz, astronomer and co-founder of the JustSpace Alliance, and Michael Metzger, Pick-Laudati Curator of Media Arts and curator of The Heart's Knowledge, to reflect on these questions. Join us for a discussion that reaches across boundaries to examine the shared pursuit of greater understanding that binds artists and scientists.

What do we owe to the memories of one another's hearts?

For American artist Dario Robleto (b. 1972), artists and scientists share a common aspiration: to increase the sensitivity of their observations. Throughout the history of scientific invention, instruments like the cardiograph and the telescope have extended the reach of perception from the tiniest stirrings of the human body to the farthest reaches of space. In his prints, sculptures, and video and sound installations, Robleto contemplates the emotional significance of these technologies, bringing us closer to the latent traces of life buried in the scientific record.

The Heart's Knowledge concentrates on the most recent decade of Robleto's creative practice, a period of deepening engagement with histories of medicine, biomedical engineering, sound recording, and space exploration. The exhibition organizes the artist's conceptually ambitious, elegantly

wrought artworks as a series of multisensory encounters between art and science. Each work seeks to attune viewers to the material traces of life at scales ranging from the intimate to the universal, returning always to the question: Does empathy extend beyond the boundaries of time and space?

LOCAL HERO (1983) on 35mm

The film follows a young American oil executive (Peter Riegert) sent by his eccentric CEO (Burt Lancaster) to a community in northern Scotland to negotiate for drilling rights—only to be charmed by the bucolic village life. Made at the height of the North Sea Oil boom of the 1980s, this endearing and richly observed film reflects the contradictions of Reagan/Thatcher-era optimism, offering an idealized—but deeply alluring—picture of the power of local culture to both resist and benefit from extractive industry.

RESIDUE (2020) with filmmaker Merawi Gerima

When: Thursday, February 9, 2023, 7:00 PM - 8:30 PM Central Where: Block Museum of Art, Mary and Leigh, 40 Arts Circle Drive, Evanston, IL Contact: Block Museum of Art, (847) 491-4000, block-museum@northwestern.edu Drawing from his upbringing, Merawi Gerima's debut feature film RESIDUE (2020) follows a young filmmaker returning to Washington DC's Q Street, a community that raised him, to find it nearly unrecognizably changed by gentrification. Jay (Obi Nwachukwu) decides to work against the transformation by writing a script, something to give "a voice to the voiceless"-a decision met with contempt and skepticism by old friends and neighbors. The film's narration itself questions that logic early on, asking whether the camera is a weapon for community resistance or a tool of archeological excavation—a line of inquiry not easily resolved. Balancing presence and absence sensitively. Gerima gives weight to the losses while also creating a vivid archive of the people and places that remain. RESIDUE does so with an exceptional ensemble of largely non-professional actors, including family and passersby from the neighborhood; a hypnotic tapestry of city sounds; and a kaleidoscopic visual style that uses multiple video formats to interweave past and present, acts of remembrance and efforts to dream. A lyrical ode to Black life and community in a vanishing city, RESIDUE represents an essential contribution to a cinematic lineage that includes Charles Burnett's KILLER OF SHEEP (1978) and Spike Lee's DO THE RIGHT THING (1989).

EAMI not only shows the impacts of deforestation and ecological devastation on the Indigenous tribes who live in Chaco, a place famous for its hard-wood forests and jungle, but also indicates how the Ayoreo-Totobiegosode peoples are able to respond and survive such changes. The word "eami", meaning both "forest" and "world" in Ayoreo, is also the name of the film's young protagonist, who navigates a landscape transformed by the violence of extraction. As she wanders, Encina layers the voices from members of Eami's tribe, who recount creation myths and relate how illegal loggers expelled them from homes. Encina's complex and dreamlike montage of image and sound earned EAMI the prestigious Tiger Award at the International Film Festival in Rotterdam along with numerous prizes in Europe and Latin America.

Following the screening, Encina will appear for a discussion with Natalia Brizuela, Associate Professor of Film & Media and Spanish & Portuguese at UC, Berkeley. Curated by Jesse Rothbard.

What starts out as a hospital drama about medical ethics takes more than one turn towards the lurid and the hallucinatory—asking profound questions about the limits of vision along the way. This 35mm screening features an introduction by Dr. Catherine Belling, Associate Professor of Medical Education at NU, whose research explores the ways that horror films reflect widely-held fears and uncertainties about our bodies and about the medical profession.

Shamanic Cinema: Trance as Resistance with Colectivo Los Ingrávidos

Since forming in Tehuacán, Mexico in 2012, Colectivo Los Ingrávidos has produced a substantial body of experimental film and video that pushes back against the political, economical, and ecological violence of the present through manipulation of visceral sonic and visual means, seeking to induce trance as a method of healing and resistance. This program contains six films — Tonalli, Altares, Toloache, Quetzaltcóalt, Chamán, and Danzes lunares — which function as ritual, urging the viewer to bring attention to their mind in new ways, thus opening up new modes of deep listening and acute awareness through spatiotemporal cinema-trance.

Following the screening, a member of Colectivo los Ingrávidos will appear for a conversation with guest curator Daisy Donaji Matias.

An essential yet underseen work of Latin American political cinema, NUESTRA VOZ DE TIERRA, MEMORIA Y FUTURO (Our Voice of Earth, Memory & Future) is a poetic nonfiction essay on the centuries-long resistance by indigenous farmers of Colombia's Coconuco region. Between fantastical visualizations of myth and legend, the film documents the development of the CRIC, the Regional Indigenous Council of Cauca, and their defiant efforts to take back ancestral earth from a long history of land grabs—a record the film traces from Spanish conquistadors to the Catholic Church to the current wealthy landowners. Trailblazing figures in Colombia's documentary tradition, Marta Rodriguez and Jorge Silva collaborated with an indigenous council made up of peasant cooperative members throughout all stages of the making of NUESTRA VOZ; together they develop a process that blends the material realities of documentary with narrative recreations of native cosmology. The result is a striking nonfiction epic and a singular contribution to revolutionary cinema.

Science on Screen: FIRST MAN (2018)

While FIRST MAN has no shortage of thrilling astronautical sequences, Chazelle is less interested in the conquest of outer space than in the inner life of its protagonist, a withdrawn man straining to maintain his composure in the face of tragedy and doubt. Grounded in universal human emotions and in the material realities of space flight, FIRST MAN transcends spectacle and myth to offer an intimate and original perspective on one of the most famous scientific achievements in history. The screening will feature an in-depth introduction by Jordan Bimm, a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Chicago's Institute on the Formation of Knowledge, who will discuss the military origins of "space medicine," the psychological and physical ordeals sustained by test subjects and aspiring astronauts, and the cultural forces that shaped the image of the model astronaut in the 1950s.

Through interviews, voice-over narration, and poetic ruminations, the film presents an intimate portrait of the workers, their desires, and the struggle to form a union, ultimately answering a question posed at the film's start: "What's the cost of producing beauty?"

It is a gathering of music and story meant to bring us closer to that thing we all avoid talking about – and thus, closer to life.

For more than 70 years, Northwestern University's Music Academy in Evanston has provided music instruction to children and adult students from surrounding communities and the greater Chicago and Northwest Indiana area.

Most Academy instructors also teach in the Henry and Leigh Bienen School of Music and hold masters and doctoral degrees in music teaching and performance. The Academy often serves as a teaching laboratory for college students enrolled in pedagogy courses and is a member of the National Guild of Community Schools of the Arts.

Kindermusik (newborn to age 6)

Dates: Term starts Jan 28 and ends May 13. Cost: \$300-355 (15-week class and home materials)

This 45-minute class is a lovely way for young children and parents to interact. Multi-level activities that are appropriate for each stage of a child's development give lap babies, crawlers, and walkers a chance to explore music, touch, sound, and movement. Home materials including a CD, a book related to the theme of the unit, and an instrument provide additional ideas for sharing the class experience at home.

Piano and Organ

The Music Academy Piano Division offers pre-piano class, which serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction: keyboard instruction in two tracks for students ages 6 to 18, and instruction for adults. Pre-piano serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction. Keyboard instruction for children begins with pre-staff music and expands to landmark-based intervallic reading. After the first year of study, most children participate in the Illinois State Music Teacher's Association curriculum assessment, where they demonstrate skills and receive certificates and pins for participation.

Strings

The String Division offers private lessons in violin, viola, and cello, with goals of both providing musical instruction and instilling a love of music and of learning music. The division believes that all children can learn to their potential when placed in an environment that includes clear instruction, an involved parent, and regular opportunities to listen to and perform.



Police procedurals and reality TV like Cops have been media staples for a long time. And while true crime as a genre isn't new, it has seen a recent surge in popularity, particularly after the release of the podcast series Serial. This paper will consider the ways that we construct coherent narratives of crime and wrongdoing with characters that play relatively well-defined roles, like heroes, victims, and villains. While of course portrayals are not necessarily endorsements, we argue that these kinds of portrayals are bound up with dichotomies that reinforce carceral ideology. In order to make these arguments we'll draw on a range of philosophical frameworks. First, we'll draw on Strawson's account of reactive attitudes and Lindemann's account of personal identity to argue that these portrayals reflect neither the agency of wrongdoers nor the full moral personhood of most of the parties involved.



This presentation will address theater's participation in the pleasure and play of knowledge in early modern Japan by emphasizing the centrality of kabuki's spectacular elements to its dramaturgy and by demonstrating how the adoption of techniques and technological innovations from spectacle shows (misemono) influenced kabuki's theater space and aesthetics. Tracing this history through the fragmentary archive of kabuki's backstage spaces



and figures—its set designers, playwrights, and theater managers in fiction and ephemera, this talk explores how texts and prints about the theater across the 19th century invited readers into the secretive spaces and perspectives behind, below, and above the stage. The illustration of these particular visions of the theater — all, in one way or another, imaginary — sheds light on kabuki as a source of spectacle, curiosity, and technological fascination across the nineteenth century.



She is also the author of the award-winning Dangerous Pregnancies: Mothers, Disabilities, and Abortion in Modern America, which investigates the German measles (rubella) epidemic of the early 1960s and the role the disease and disabilities played in early abortion law reform.

Santiago Molina - "Social Control at the Edge of Science: Positive Deviance in Human Genome Editing"

Genome editing constitutes an exceptional case for analyzing mechanisms of social control in modern science as new normative limits have to be articulated and enforced. Recent instances of deviance and moral unhingement illustrate how technological development in the field is coupled with the blurring of these normative limits. Through an in-depth case study of the controversial first case of the birth of gene-edited babies in 2018, I argue that an opaque system of positive deviance can be found within the genome editing community that contrasts with the responsible and democratic mechanisms of social control that the community presents externally.

Santiago J. Molina (he/they) grew up moving between the United States and central Mexico. He received his PhD in Sociology from the University of California, Berkeley and his BA from the University of Chicago. Their work sits at the intersections of science and technology studies, political sociology, sociology of racial and ethnic relations, and bioethics. On a theoretical level, Santiago's work concerns the deeply entangled relationship between the production of knowledge and the production of social order.

Through readings of Chang-rae Lee's On Such a Full Sea (2014) and other texts, Huang develops the term studious deracination to refer to a narrative strategy defined by an evacuated racial consciousness that is used to ironize assumptions of white universalism and uncritical postracialism. Studious deracination challenges medical discourse's "colorblind" approach to healthcare and enables a reconsideration of comparative racialization in a moment of accelerating social disintegration and blasted landscapes. Indeed, while precision medicine promises to replace race with genomics, Asian American literature is key to showing how this "postracial" promise depends on framing racial inequality as a symptom, rather than an underlying etiology, of infrastructures of public health.

Michelle N. Huang (she/her/hers, Ph.D. English and Women's Studies, Pennsylvania State University), jointly appointed in the English Department and in the Asian American Studies Program, has research and teaching interests in contemporary Asian American literature, posthumanism, and feminist science studies.

In K-12 education, for example, 87% of references to Indigenous Americans portray them in a pre-1900's context. In mainstream media, less than .5% of representations are of contemporary Indigenous Peoples. Utilizing both experimental and national survey studies, I will demonstrate that prevalent representations of Indigenous Peoples (or the lack thereof) shape how people think, feel, and subsequently act towards Indigenous Peoples, as well as how Indigenous Peoples feel about themselves and act to make change in society." Dr. Stephanie A. Fryberg, a member of the Tulalip Tribes of Washington State, is the Director of The Research for Indigenous Social Action and Equity. Dr. Fryberg is also a Diversity and Social Transformation Professor of Psychology at the University of Michigan. As a social and cultural psychologist, her research focuses on how social representations of race, culture, and social class influence the development of self, psychological well-being, physical health, and educational attainment. In addition to publishing articles in leading academic journals, Dr. Fryberg provided testimony to the U.S. Senate Committee on Indian Affairs, received the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues Early Career Award, and was inducted into Stanford University's Multicultural Alumni Hall of Fame.


