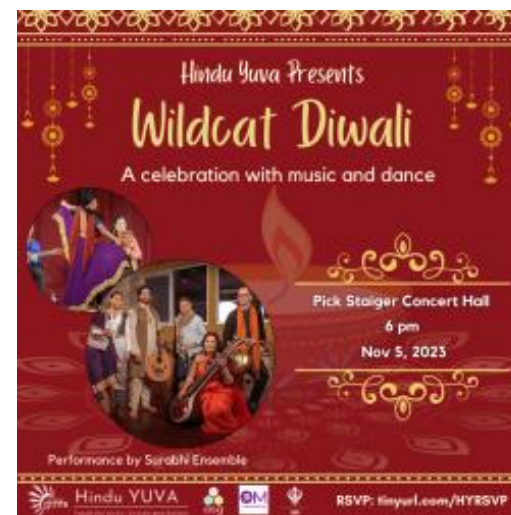

It is nearing midnight in Wyoming, where four young conservatives have gathered at a backyard afterparty. They have returned home to toast their mentor Gina, newly inducted as president of a tiny Catholic college. But as their reunion spirals into spiritual chaos and clashing generational politics, it becomes less a celebration than a vicious fight to be understood. In this haunting new play, a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in 2020, playwright Will Arbery, an alum of Northwestern's MFA in Writing for the Screen & Stage,

offers a story of grace and disarming clarity, speaking to the heart of a country at war with itself.

Muse @ Dittmar Gallery

October 20 - December 3

Muse, a collaborative body of work by visual artist Niki Grangruth and multimedia artist James Kinser, explores non-conforming gender identity by reimagining and reinterpreting well-known paintings of female subjects from art history. Through the use of a male subject, gaze, and hand-made costumes, each photograph questions common gender-specific beauty ideals, disrupts the pervasive construct of binary gender identity, and explores gender as a non-linear and ever-changing performative act. These challenges to socially constructed gender norms are juxtaposed with overt references to art history, which grounds the work in the familiar and accessible.

Dittmar is located on the ground floor of Norris Center. This student-run gallery space features 5-6 exhibitions per year.

When the cruel Emperor orders a senseless total war, Death decides to put an end to the chaos by going on strike. The people long for a release from the struggles of life, but only by willingly going to his own death can the Emperor convince Death to resume his role. Composed in the concentration camp at Terezin between 1943

and 1944, and finally premiered by the Netherlands Opera in 1975, Viktor Ullmann's *The Emperor of Atlantis* is both a satire on militarism and an unsettling contemplation of what life might be like if humankind were given immortality. In this new staging with additional musical selections, the story introduces further questions about the nature of information and propaganda in the age of artificial intelligence.

Run time approximately 70 minutes. Performed in English.

The ensemble's second concert of the fall quarter is centered around themes of loss, grief, and spirituality. Carlos Simon's *Go Down Moses*, inspired by the spiritual of the same name, depicts the Biblical story of Moses and the ten plagues from the perspective of the despairing Pharaoh. *Dream Elegy*, composed by new Bienen School dean Jonathan Bailey Holland, is a somber response to the Black Lives Matter movement, dedicated to those who felt powerless against the system that allowed racist acts of violence to occur. Commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic and Esa-Pekka Salonen and transcribed from the original works by Henry Purcell, Steven Stucky's *Funeral Music for Queen Mary* is a haunting mix of Baroque and contemporary sounds. The concert closes with Olivier Messiaen's massive commemoration of the dead of both world wars, *Et exspecto resurrectionem mortuorum*.

The Neo-Bop Era and the Young Lions Movement—“What’s old is new again”

Derrick Gardner, conductor

At the close of the 1970s, the conversation around the future of jazz was contentious. Miles Davis had gone electric, Herbie Hancock was embracing early hip-hop, fusion was incorporating rock elements, and jazz was branching away from tradition. In the 1980s, a group of young, talented musicians signaled a return to the foundations of jazz, playing bebop, classic swing, and music from the Great American Songbook. These “Young Lions”—including such artists as Wynton Marsalis, Terence Blanchard, Donald Harrison, Kevin Eubanks, and Wallace Roney—advocated for the elevation of jazz to “fine art” status, paving the way for the Jazz at Lincoln Center program. Enjoy selections from the artists whose work heralded a new direction for the genre.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is poised to transform the pursuit of scientific knowledge. Emerging technology designed to replicate the success of large language models in other areas, holds immense potential for reshaping early diagnosis, prevention, and treatment strategies for complex medical conditions, and provide surprising insights into hard questions in biology and the social sciences. Title: Turbulence-driven hyporheic flow: connecting fine particle deposition, clogging and nutrient cycles

During this seminar, I will present how coupling surface water flow, hyporheic exchange and clogging led us to determine that surface water turbulence plays a key role in the deposition of fine particles in riverbeds, and in the attenuation of hyporheic exchange. These new insights will be essential to better quantify the role of rivers in carbon and nitrogen cycling estimations, and future work will be directed on upscaling these soil-grain scale processes into basic-scale models.
