Jonathan's previous book, Ali: A Life, won a 2018 PEN America Literary Award and was a finalist for the Mark Lynton History Prize. His works have been translated into more than a dozen languages.

Jonathan is a graduate of Northwestern University's Medill School. He began his writing career at age 16, working for his hometown newspaper, The Rockland County (N.Y.) Journal News and went on to work as a reporter for The New Orleans Times-Picayune, The Dallas Morning News, Chicago Magazine, and The Wall Street Journal.



# 100 Years Back, 100 Years Forward: Sovereignty, Community and Indigenous Futures

Center for Native American and Indigenous Research (CNAIR) in partnership with the Pritzker School of Law at Northwestern University is excited to present a 2-day convening entitled "100 Years Back, 100 Years Forward:

# Sovereignty, Community, and Indigenous Futures"!

This convening will bring together experts from various Tribes and multiple disciplines and is intended to reflect on the last 100 years since the passing of the 1924 Indian Citizenship Act and its impact on the sovereignty of tribal nations. But more importantly it is to invite thought and imagination of Indigenous futures moving forward. This event is part of CNAIR's ten year plan to create collective engagement with the many layers and dynamics that are implicated

both by the historical conditions that have created the present and what is critical in exercising self-determination over the next 100 years. We envision three major plenary sessions based on three different perspectives provoking reflections and dialogue. Panel I will focus on historical insights from the last 100 years of the Indian Citizenship Act. Panel II will explore changes in the perspective for the future. Panel III will look at how to engage institutions for societal change.

Actions for the Earth: Art, Care & Ecology is a traveling exhibition that considers kinship, healing, and restorative interventions as artistic practices and strategies to foster a deeper consciousness of our interconnectedness with the earth.

A recent overlapping of worldwide crises related to ongoing climate change, entrenched social inequity, and renewed concerns over public health has underscored the need for complex approaches. It has become necessary to assume global responsibilities while caring for our local environment; to find new antidotes to oppressive structures of power; to grasp nature, health, and sustainability as intertwined.

Actions for the Earth is a resource for current times, reminding us that we are connected within a constellation of living networks, inseparable from the earth. The exhibition emphasizes learning, care, and intimacy, inviting its publics to participate in instruction-based meditation and deep listening among other actions. During the tour, projects will generate site-specific exchanges between the artists, the environment, and local communities, growing and changing over time.



The average museum visitor spends less than 30 seconds looking at a work of art. It usually takes us far less than that to draw conclusions about what we see; the human brain seems to perform this work automatically and instantaneously. How do we slow down our looking habits to better understand the process of meaning-making? How do our individual backgrounds and lived experiences affect how and what we see? We invite you to enter our teaching gallery and engage in a typical classroom activity: an exercise in close looking that can be used to analyze any work of art. We have intentionally excluded contextual and interpretive texts from the walls of this exhibition so you can begin your visit with direct observation of the artworks. Information about each artwork and discussion prompts are available in the brochure holder and on our website. You can do this exercise on your own or in conversation with other visitors.

This exhibition supports Northwestern University's undergraduate curriculum with emphasis on first-year students. Works on view are from The Block's collection and were selected with the help of faculty members across campus to relate to themes in their courses. Faculty members

The film is in Persian with English subtitles. Organized by the Northwestern University Colloquium for Global Iran Studies (CoGIS), and co-sponsored by the Alice Kaplan Institute for the Humanities and the

School of Education and Social Policy, Alborz: We Climb Mountains (2023, 86 mins.), tells the story of Alborz high school during many tumultuous years in Iran's modern history.

The story is told through the perspectives of its graduates and teachers, as well as famed Iranian educator Mohammad-Ali Mojtahedi's own voice from archival recordings. Using humor, fondness, and nostalgia for a bygone era, the film exemplifies what has been lost in the years since the 1979 Revolution and why today so many among the bright and promising young Iranians sound critical of current policies and administrative mishandling of one of their country's once top educational institutions.

The Grammy Award-winning Parker Quartet has rapidly distinguished itself as one of the preeminent ensembles of its generation. The quartet's numerous honors include winning the Concert Artists Guild Competition, the Grand Prix and Mozart Prize at France's Bordeaux International String Quartet Competition, and Chamber Music America's Cleveland Quartet Award. Recent seasons included performances throughout the United States and Europe, with engagements at Wigmore Hall, Konzerthaus Berlin, the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society, Strathmore, and the San Antonio

Chamber Music Society. The quartet is committed to working with composers of today, with recent commissions including works by Augusta Read Thomas, Felipe Lara, Jaehyuck Choi, and Zosha di Castri. In the 2022-23 season, the Quartet marked their 20th anniversary with The Beethoven Project, a multi-faceted initiative which includes performances of the complete cycle of Beethoven's string quartets; the commissioning of six composers to write encores inspired by Beethoven's quartets; the creation of a new video library spotlighting each Beethoven quartet; and bringing Beethoven's music to non-traditional venues around the quartet's home base of Boston, including homeless shelters and youth programs.

Annalee Patipatanakoon, violin; Roman Borys, cello; Jamie Parker, piano The Gryphon Trio is firmly established as one of the world's preeminent piano trios, regularly touring throughout North America and Europe and enjoying longstanding relationships with the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity, Ottawa Chamberfest, and Festival del Lago International Academy of Music in Ajijic, Mexico. The trio often performs triple concerti with the world's major symphony orchestras and smaller chamber orchestras, and their prolific recording catalogue includes 22 releases on the Analekta, Naxos, and other labels. Honors include 11 nominations and three Juno Awards for Classical Album of the Year. The Gryphons are ensemble-in-residence at the Isabel Bader Centre for Performing Arts in Kingston, Ontario, and artists-in-residence at Trinity College, University of Toronto. Since 2010, the trio's ground-breaking outreach program, Listen Up!, has inspired 16 Canadian communities to collaborate on large-scale multifaceted arts creation projects.

Trumpeter, vocalist, bandleader, and composer John Birks "Dizzy" Gillespie was a leading figure in the development of the bebop subgenre, recognized for his unique combination of musicianship, showmanship, and wit. His compositions "Groovin' High," "Woody 'n' You," "Salt Peanuts," and "A Night in Tunisia" marked a dramatic shift from the swing music popular at the time, paving the way for a new path in the jazz genre. Gillespie taught and influenced numerous other musicians, among them Clifford Brown. "Brownie," as he was affectionately known, quickly made a name for himself as a leading voice on the trumpet in the bands of Tadd Dameron, Art Blakey, Lionel Hampton, J. J. Johnson, and Max Roach. With Roach, Brown formed the Clifford Brown/Max Roach quintet, in which he completed arguably his most important creative work as a trumpeter and composer. His life was tragically cut short by a car accident in 1956, but his legacy continues to live on. The Joe Clark and Darius Hampton ensembles celebrate the lives and legacies of Brown and Gillespie.

# A Metaphysical Mapping Problem for Race Theorists and Human Population Geneticists

**Abstract.** In this talk, I identify and clarify a mapping phenomenon that's almost twenty years old. The phenomenon is that the populations at a fivefold subdivision of humans into biological populations—the so-called human continental populations—correspond one-to-one with the five official races of the Office of Management and Budget in the US government. This phenomenon has raised the interesting philosophical question of what exactly is the metaphysical relation being exemplified by this particular mapping. Metaphysicians of race have offered multiple different theories. Most importantly, Levin thinks that it's co-exemplification of a certain kind of biological population, Ásta has argued that it's a function of tracking, Hardimon has argued that it's co-exemplification of minimalist race, and Taylor thinks that the relation is (at

best) co-extension. However, in this paper, I argue that the metaphysical relation that's exemplified is identity. After presenting and defending the identity thesis, I explore interesting implications of the identity thesis for race theorists and NIH-funded medical scientists.

# The Art of Betrayal: French Holocaust Film, Art Collecting, and the Mystery of French Jewish Identity


