An evening of choral settings of poetry by Rainer Maria Rilke, whose beautiful and powerful words explore the human experience of transcendence. Paul Hindemith's *Six chansons* elegantly set the poet's miniature French poems, which vividly depict fleeting moments of truth via their descriptions of the natural world. Die erste Elegie by the Finnish composer Einojuhani Rautavaara transforms one of Rilke's most complex poems (and one of the poet's own favorites) into a dramatic work for virtuoso choir. Also on the program is a commission from Illinois composer Stephen Andrew Taylor ('87) and the American premiere of Rilke settings by Canadian composer Ramona Luengen.



Genre and Conversation

Conversations belong to different genres. For example: Some conversations are aimed at information exchange, while others are aimed at deciding what to do. In some we make firm commitments, in others we merely explore options. In some we stick to the facts, while in others we engage in makebelieve. Finally, some conversations are cooperative while others are adversarial. I argue that these kinds of genre don't arise from social conventions, but are constituted by recurring patterns in the shared conversation plans that we build together in order to organize discourse. Different dimensions of genre variation arise from patterns at different levels within conversation plans, including our plans to resolve the "question under discussion," as well higher-level plans that may or may not be shared by the interlocutors. Finally, I argue that a capacity to navigate genre is not, strictly speaking, necessary for all communication, but can make communication much more efficient. In this sense, this capacity should be understood as part of our pragmatic competence.

In the contemporary media environment individuals often encounter myths. falsehoods, rumors, reporting errors, and conspiracy theories deliberately or inadvertently circulated by the media, governments, and other interest groups. These types of dis/misinformation pose a substantial challenge, and in some cases, can result in physical harm, or even death. To this end, massive efforts are devoted to debunk misinformation; yet, scientific evidence of the effectiveness of these measures appear to be inconsistent. While some studies have found that corrective information can successfully debunk falsehoods, other studies suggest that individuals may struggle to discount misinformation, and, in some cases, correction attempts can even backfire by increasing support for the discredited position. Dr. Walter will present findings from his ongoing work on the continued influence of misinformation and the ability of nonpartisan fact-checkers to challenge the veracity of false information. The talk will also explore various psychological mechanisms that underlie these effects and provide specific recommendations for more effective correction efforts.

Intuition is a necessary part of everyday life, without which we could not make it through a day. Epidemiologists are taught to rely on science, reason, and facts in their work and yet, it is likely that we use intuition all the time. 
