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

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Northwestern Music Academy Learn more online



For more than 70 years, Northwestern University's Music Academy in Evanston has provided music instruction to children and adult students from surrounding communities and the greater Chicago and Northwest Indiana area.

Most Academy instructors also teach in the Henry and Leigh Bienen School of Music and hold masters and doctoral degrees in music teaching and performance. The Academy often serves as a teaching laboratory for college students enrolled in pedagogy courses and is a member of the National Guild of Community Schools of the Arts.

Kindermusik (newborn to age 7)

Where: Online Dates: Term starts Sept. 19 and ends Jan. 16 Cost: \$300-355 (15-week class and home materials)

This 45-minute class is a lovely way for young children and parents to interact. Multi-level activities that are appropriate for each stage of a child's development give lap babies, crawlers, and walkers a chance to explore music, touch, sound, and movement. Home materials including a CD, a book related to the theme of the unit, and an instrument provide additional ideas for sharing the class experience at home.

> Other Courses (offered virtually Fall Quarter)

Piano and Organ

The Music Academy Piano Division offers pre-piano class, which serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction: keyboard instruction in two tracks for students ages 6 to 18, and instruction for adults. Pre-piano serves as an introduction to more formal piano instruction. Keyboard instruction for children begins with pre-staff music and expands to landmark-based intervallic reading. After the first year of study, most children participate in the Illinois State Music Teacher's Association curriculum assessment, where they demonstrate skills and receive certificates and pins for participation.

Strings

The String Division offers private lessons in violin, viola, and cello, with goals of both providing musical instruction and instilling a love of music and of learning music. The division believes that all children can learn to their potential when placed in an environment that includes clear instruction, an involved parent, and regular opportunities to listen to and perform.

Voice (Adults)

The Music Academy has canceled chorus rehearsals and voice classes for fall quarter and will reassess for winter 2021.

Just Mercy by Bryan Stevenson Selected for One Book Program 2020-2021

This year's selection of Bryan Stevenson's *Just Mercy* challenges us to examine and confront the systemic racism, inequities, and moral failures of the United States criminal justice system. Perhaps now more than ever, Stevenson's voice needs to be heard. The recent deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and other Black Americans at the hands of police violence have ignited a global reckoning with America's pernicious investment in policing, criminalization, and incarceration. The failure to adequately address the COVID-19 crisis, especially as it devastated vulnerable communities, including prison populations, revealed the nation's prioritizing of some lives over others.

But Stevenson calls us forward to a better, fairer world—one that is more just in being more merciful. As a nation, we can divest from the systems that have led to this national crisis and invest in the values that will truly make our communities flourish, such as education, healthcare, and support services. As we read Just Mercy together this year, let's accept Stevenson's invitation to rethink what justice demands and, in so doing, to reimagine what is possible.

One Book One Northwestern is a community-wide reading program hosted by the Office of the President. It aims to engage the campus in a common conversation centered on a carefully chosen, thought-provoking book. It began in 2005 for students in the Weinberg College of Arts and Sciences and has since evolved into a community-wide program involving students, faculty and staff from all majors and departments.

Everyone is encouraged to read the One Book selection. The Office of the President sends a free copy to incoming first-year and transfer students the summer before they arrive on campus.

Beyond Detention : Long-Term Outcomes of Youth in the Juvenile Justice System

Using thousands of publicly available data provided by The Invisible Institute, Papachristos' research shows that patterns of police violence follow patterns similar to those of infectious disease—and understanding those patterns might allow cities to mitigate some of the harms associated with police misconduct as we, as a society, strive for mercy and justice.

The last decade has seen the publication of important scholarship from different disciplines on the making of the middle classes across the world. In this presentation, historian Ricardo López-Pedreros will seek to bring together this interdisciplinary production to initiate a critical conversation on how to rethink the historical formation of the middle classes—as a social category, a political project, a subjectivity, and a material reality—in Latin America during the second half of the 20th century.

The presentation will proceed in two ways. First, it will offer a transnational genealogy of the idea of the middle class in the Americas to explain why, despite the increasing number of scholars committed to the study of the middle classes, this class appears vestigial—that is, as a class that does not matter—in what is considered a "proper" analysis of power relationships. Second, by drawing on the case of Colombia in a transitional framework, it will demonstrate how the study of the historical formation of the middle classes during the Cold War opens up a multiplicity of questions to rethink major historical processes in Latin America: meanings of citizenship, the relationship between state and society, experiences of (counter) revolutionary change, the growth of affective labor, the naturalization of

different forms of material inequality, and democracy as a methodology of domination.


