Reserve material

Book chapters, articles: The library can place on reserve digital versions of book excerpts, or articles from journals or newspapers, which will display under course reserves within your Canvas site. Items in the public domain can be scanned in their entirety for eReserve upon request.

Please note, the Library's staff will scan and make available no more than 15% of any single book, or no more than a single article from a periodical. For requests outside these guidelines, staff will seek permission from the copyright holder and pay any associated fees, if reasonable.

Streaming Audio and Video: Course Reserves provides streamed audio and video services for University courses for faculty, graduate students, and staff.

Textbooks: The library has been working with student government to purchase textbooks for high-enrollment undergraduate courses. Simply request the textbook or any item you need for your course via course reserve in Canvas.
