Dear members of the Northwestern community,

We have no higher priority than your safety and security. To ensure Northwestern can quickly and effectively warn students, faculty, staff and visitors about an immediate or imminent threat on campus, the University will test its campus-wide emergency notification system (Rave) next week. Emergency messages are sent from AlertNU.

An AlertNU test message will be sent to you at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 2, 2022, via text, email and phone.

It is vitally important that the University can reach you during an emergency or other serious threat. Please take a moment to verify your emergency messaging contact information in <a href="mayHR">myHR</a> or <a href="mayHR">CAESAR</a> and make relevant updates as needed. Emergency communications sent by text message are often issued the fastest. The following guides can assist you with verifying or updating your mobile number for emergency notifications via text.

You may also <u>review these steps</u> to log in to the emergency notification system (Rave) to validate your emergency messaging contact information uploaded from myHR or CAESAR.

#### Immediate or imminent threats

In the event of an immediate threat, an urgent message titled "AlertNU" will notify members of the Northwestern community via text, email and, potentially, phone. If the emergency requires immediate action, such as an active aggressor, information also will be posted on the University's homepage and social media channels.

AlertNU messages will be denoted with the color red, where possible. Some communications, including text messages, are limited to plain text and will not include the color red.

Emergency email messages will appear with the following header:



In addition, to demonstrate how to respond in the event of a violent, life-threatening emergency on campus, Northwestern has produced a training video on the "Run, Hide, Fight" safety protocol.

### Serious or continuing threats

For other critical incidents and potential safety threats, such as robberies, sexual assaults, aggravated assaults or vehicle thefts, you will receive email messages titled "Crime Notice," denoted with the following purple header:

We recommend that all parents, contractors, visitors, vendors, members of the Evanston community, hospital partners in Chicago and others opt into the University emergency notification system.
