I am proud to say that our collaboration with and support of Northwestern Settlement was the highlight of our year. Continuing a long tradition, Circle provided a wonderful holiday for five Settlement families in December, with generous gift cards for food and individual presents to all the members of five families. Additional funds were sent to the Settlement Emergency Fund in January, and all of our membership dues collected last fall were sent to the Settlement Food Pantry. These contributions amounted to over \$1200.

Members of Settlement's Golden Agers Club were the recipients of beautiful quilts created by the Piecemakers, Circle's talented quilting group. Our assistance to Settlement has made a difference in so many lives.

The highlight of the spring is choosing Circle Scholarship recipients from Northwestern's staff who are working on degrees in the School of Professional Studies. Thank you to the many contributors to this fund. This year, because of the outstanding number of applicants and the increased need, the Circle Board augmented the scholarship fund with \$2000 from our checking account to give scholarships of \$1800 to four recipients instead of three. 
We congratulate them and look forward to honoring them at a special virtual presentation to be held on May 18 via Zoom.

HOLIDAY PROJECT CONTINUES WHEN IT'S NEEDED MOST



On February 1, the members of Circle were guests of University Guild at their Zoom program. Many were able to attend and they heard an interesting speaker: Dr. Daniel Greene, who is an adjunct professor in Northwestern's History Department and president and librarian of the Newberry Library.

Dr. Greene used the resources of his library and institutional archives to research an interesting and heretofore hidden part of the history of the Newberry Library and of Chicago. It was revealed that the Newberry as an institution engaged in discriminatory practices by including multiple restrictive covenants barring African Americans from renting Newberry-owned properties during the 1930s and 1940s, of which there were



many. Perhaps a stanza from Langston Hughes' poem, "Restrictive Covenants," sums this up well:

> In Chicago They've got covenants Restricting me — Hemmed in On the South Side. Can't breathe free.

The University Guild, of which I am a member, welcomes any of those in Circle who would like to join. The organization holds teas twice each month during the NU academic year, with very interesting speakers, NU students who perform at our Christmas program and WAMU singers who give a concert for us. Speakers are drawn from the NU faculty and interesting representatives from the local and Chicago artistic and historical community. We meet in the Guild Room of Scott Hall on the Evanston campus or by Zoom during the current pandemic.

Deborah's Place is a service organization that has been helping unaccompanied and homeless women in Chicago since 1985. The goal for Piecemakers is to donate 40 lap quilts to the women living in the permanent supportive housing facility by early December. They are mostly in their 50s, disabled but mobile, and women of color.

Piecemakers have been meeting via Zoom since January, with thanks to Debbie Crimmins who has handled the technology. It's always fun to see what members are working on and have accomplished, and to share vaccine as well as other stories and, recently, tales of travel.

Ann Duncan-Gibbs, who has been a member of the group from almost the beginning, will be moving to lowa later this year, and we have literally been with her as she sews and packs and sews and packs. Fortunately, Ann will be able to stay connected with the group thanks to Zoom.

In the upcoming weeks and throughout summer, the group plans to resume meeting in Carol Nielsen's backyard to tie quilts. Everyone is looking forward to that for many reasons.
